

ROYAL COLLEGE OF VETERINARY SURGEONS' WAR MEMORIAL FUND AND LIBRARY

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Along with portraits and photographs of past presidents, the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons' (RCVS) staircase also displays a number of war memorials. One especially impressive memorial pays tribute to the sixty seven members of the RCVS who lost their lives during the First World War.

The Army Veterinary Corps (AVC) was formed in 1903 following pressure to reform the Army Veterinary Services after the enormous animal losses incurred in the South African War (1899-1902). In 1906 the Corps combined with the Army Veterinary Department and in 1907 Major General Sir Frederick Smith became Director General and set about reorganising the force and introducing modern veterinary methods and equipment.

At the outbreak of the First World War there were 364 AVC officers; by 1918 this had increased to over 1,600 officers, with half of the members of the RCVS at that time serving in the AVC. The AVC established mobile veterinary sections to evacuate wounded animals from the front line to the veterinary hospitals. Here they were treated for battle injuries as well as exhaustion, skin diseases and the effects of gas.

During the South African War animal losses were great, however, the First World War saw a relatively high success rate – over 2 million of the 2.5 million horses hospitalised in France returned to duty. On 27 November 1918 King George V conferred the Royal prefix to the Corps in recognition of their work.

The RCVS also wished to recognise the work of the AVC and in particular the sacrifice of its members who had died on active service. The RCVS annual report for 1919/1920 notes the Council's decision to appeal for funds for a 'memorial to commemorate the sacrifice made by members of the College ... during the recent war'.¹ It was hoped that donations would be generous enough to fund a Memorial Tablet and to provide a large endowment to the Library, in Red Lion Square.

After an initial surge of interest, with details of many promised donations published in *The Veterinary Record* on 13 March 1920, the progress of the fund

began to falter. At the 1920 AGM, Mr Thomas Salusbury Price, member of council, expressed his disappointment² – he did not consider a donation of £2 per MRCVS an unreasonable amount. At this time there were three thousand members of the College, which would represent a fund of £6,000. Mr Price himself donated the sum of £100.

The RCVS' Registrar, Fred Bullock, confided in a personal letter to Major General Sir Frederick Smith that 'the war memorial fund had not realised nearly as much as I looked for.'³ In the same letter, Bullock stated he was determined to 'tap the societies and perhaps the students' for donations toward the memorial; he firmly believed in involving veterinary students in the profession as early as possible in their careers. Bullock's view had previously been expressed in an issue of *The Veterinary Record* 'The Fund deserves support from every member who can afford it and from every Veterinary Society'.⁴ Following further appeals, including one to past and present officers of the Royal Army Veterinary Corps (RAVC), and with the Fund standing at £962. 6s. 3d⁵ the memorial was installed in the College at a cost of £155 in March 1921.

The commissioning of the Memorial and the proposed expansion of the library were intended to give expression to the 'gratitude and pride'⁶ felt by the veterinary profession, towards those that gave their lives. At the ceremonial unveiling of the plaque on 7 April 1921 the contribution of the RAVC to the war effort was emphasised in a speech given by Major-General Layton Blenkinsop, Director-General of the Army Veterinary Service. He noted that the admirable work done by the RAVC in 'the saving of animal wastage was an essential factor in helping us to victory' which resulted in 'a saving to the taxpayer of over £127,000,000'⁷ in comparison to the animal casualties of the South African War.

The memorial measures 58cm in width and 123cm at its tallest and bears the dates of the First World War, and the names of nine members of the RCVS killed in action, twenty four who died of wounds and thirty four who died of disease. Carved at the apex is the College crest, flanked by two oak branches, symbolising patriotism, bravery and strength. An ornate scroll, below the names of the dead, gives the Latin phrase '*Dulce et Decorum est Pro Patria Mori*'.

In May 1920 an editorial in *The Veterinary Record* expressed the hope to 'perpetuate many worthy names' some that would be 'widely recognised as such by their contemporaries'⁸ by instating a memorial in the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons.

So what do we know about these ‘worthy names’? Investigations show that fifty four were serving with the AVC when they died and a further seven with other national veterinary corps. There is quite a spread in age – inevitably many died young, with four dying within a year of graduating, alongside this there are six who were aged over fifty some of whom had served previously in the South African War. Between them the sixty seven men had served on most of the front lines of war around the world. As a result they are buried, or commemorated, in the battlefields of France, Egypt, Greece, Turkey, Malta and India, amongst others. Not all of the names had obituary notices in *The Veterinary Record* but from those that did we can learn a little more about the background and character of these men.

Lieutenant John Wilson Brownless left England for Turkey as a renowned vet in polo-playing circles, and the recipient of many scholastic awards. He died attending to injured horses under heavy shell fire, aged 40, and is buried in the Pink Farm Cemetery, Helles.^{9, 10}

Captain William Benn Cronyn, a favourite in Irish hunting circles, volunteered for Foreign Service despite being over military age. He died on 1 February 1918 in a hospital in Marseilles, aged 55, of meningitis.¹¹

Lieutenant Colonel John R.D. Beech graduated from Edinburgh in 1881. He served in the Egyptian War and then joined the Gordon Relief Expedition. Later he went to Abyssinia and single-handedly carried a letter from Queen Victoria to King John of Abyssinia for which he was awarded the C.M.G. He rejoined the army for the South African War and commanded the 2nd Regiment of the Scottish Horse from 1904-1913 before taking command of the 2/1st Regiment of the Scottish Horse in 1914.¹²

Captain Archibald Wright Campbell, the only son of Archibald Wright MRCVS, joined the AVC as soon as he graduated from Glasgow. Serving in Salonica and Palestine he sustained a gunshot wound to the head in action and died, aged 22, over two weeks later on 13th December 1918. He is buried in Kantara War Memorial Cemetery, Egypt.¹³

Captain Harry Leonard Anthony was the son of a well known horse breeder and was one of six brothers at the Front. Graduating from London in 1901 he saw service in South Africa. He was Officer commanding the 1/1 London Mobile Veterinary Service which on arrival in France in 1916 was attached to the 56th Division and was mentioned in dispatches for his services in the great push on the Somme. He was killed instantly on 2 May 1917, aged 40, and is buried in the cemetery in Arras.¹⁴

Lieutenant Stuart Kirby Jones was Veterinary Officer in charge of 25th Brigade of the Royal Field Artillery. He was wounded on the 15 September 1914 and died of his wounds, aged 25, on 18 September 1914. He is buried in the cemetery in Versailles. His obituary records his brilliant academic career at Liverpool, where he won numerous medals, 'his moral courage' and his prize winning athleticism.¹⁵

Captain Robert W. Clarke gave up an 'extensive practice' to join up soon after war broke out. He was on board the 'Mercian' when she was shelled by a U Boat in the Mediterranean and survived many hours in the water. He died, from dysentery, in hospital in Cairo on 19 August 1918 leaving a widow and two young daughters.¹⁶

What of the other intention of the Memorial Fund, namely to provide an endowment to the RCVS Library to enable it to catalogue its collections and introduce a lending library?

At the unveiling ceremony for the memorial RCVS President Mr O. Charnock Bradley spoke of how:

'... a library at one and the same time shows how knowledge has been acquired – painfully, for the most part – and points the direction in which a further advance is to be made. In it the past speaks to the present and the future, and surely that is the very spirit of memorial'.¹⁷

Past President John McKinna spoke of:

'... the great need [for] a sufficient income to keep the library up to date and to render the literature it contains easily accessible by means of a detailed catalogue'.¹⁸

After a further plea for more support for the Memorial Fund he then invited the guests to view the library, renamed the 'War Memorial Library', which had been relocated to a larger room on the second floor of Red Lion Square.

In addition to giving the library additional space RCVS Council had also agreed to purchase some current veterinary literature with the remaining Memorial Fund. However there were insufficient funds to purchase the additional shelving required or to put in place the cataloguing of the books. A further appeal was made for funds during 1921 but it appears that they were not forthcoming and in the Annual Report for 1921/22 the Librarian refers to the expected annual interest on the Fund and states that:

‘It is obvious that the ordinary income of the Fund is quite inadequate for the maintenance of a Central library for the profession, and that an annual grant from the general funds of the College will be necessary’.¹⁹

The Annual Report for 1922/23 records that this annual grant was agreed and set at a sum of £100 per annum. It is recorded that this additional income meant that the additional furniture could be purchased, a postal loan service introduced and a temporary member of staff employed to commence work on a catalogue.²⁰

The material recorded in that catalogue forms the basis of the current Library’s Historical Collection. The postal loan service continues although, of course, much information is now available electronically. It is unlikely, however, that any current library user is aware that its origins began with the desire to honour the sacrifice made by members of the profession nearly a century ago.
